

HEART ENERGIZING

Malnutrition among pregnant women is a pressing issue, especially in slum areas where poverty and lack of access to nutritious food are rampant. This lack of proper nutrition during pregnancy can lead to serious health consequences for both mothers and their unborn children, one of the most alarming being congenital heart defects (CHDs).



Congenital heart defects are structural problems with the heart that are present at birth. They can range from mild to severe and can lead to significant health challenges throughout a person's life. Research suggests that nutritional deficiencies during pregnancy can play a critical role in the development of these defects. For pregnant women living in slums, the challenges of obtaining adequate nutrition are multifaceted. Limited access to healthcare, lack of education regarding nutrition, economic hardships, and food scarcity contribute to a cycle of malnutrition that can have dire consequences.

Key nutrients that are essential for fetal development include folic acid, iron, calcium, and various vitamins. Folic acid, in particular, is crucial during early pregnancy, as it helps in the formation of the neural tube, which ultimately develops into the brain and spinal cord. A deficiency in folic acid has been linked to congenital anomalies, including some types of heart defects. Furthermore, inadequate intake of iron can lead to anemia in the mother, restricting oxygen supply to the fetus, which can impair heart development. As a result, children born to malnourished mothers may face a higher risk of developing congenital heart defects.

In a world where every child deserves a chance to thrive and grow, an alarming number of young lives hang in the balance due to congenital heart defects (CHDs). These conditions, which are structural issues present at birth, affect approximately 1 in 100 newborns, making them one of the most common birth defects. Unfortunately, for many families, the financial burden of treatment is often insurmountable, leaving countless children suffering and without the vital medical care they urgently need.

It is in this critical context that PSF is reaching out to families who are looking for fund assistance to ensure the survival and well-being of their vulnerable children. PSF, has dedicated itself to addressing the urgent needs of children suffering from congenital heart defects. For years, we have been working tirelessly to provide medical assistance, counseling, and financial support to families in desperate situations. We have partnered with esteemed hospitals and medical professionals to facilitate surgeries and treatments that would otherwise be out of reach. However, our resources are limited, and the demand for assistance continues to grow. During 2023-2024, 4 children get assistance for surgery at various Govt. Hospitals located at Delhi.

HEALTH FOR ALL

In communities around the world, access to basic healthcare remains a privilege rather than a right. For many underprivileged individuals and families, the barrier to achieving good health can be insurmountable. Health check-ups are crucial in maintaining the well-being of individuals, especially those in underserved communities. Regular health assessments can lead to early detection of diseases, management of chronic conditions, and overall improved health outcomes. Unfortunately, many people in low-income areas lack access to even the most basic health services. They often face logistical challenges—such as distance to medical facilities, cost of transportation, and inability to pay for services—which can deter them from seeking necessary medical care.



This is where non-governmental organizations (NGOs) play a vital role in bridging the gap, PSFs dedicated to health initiatives are stepping in to fill this gap. PSF collaborates with local dispensaries to provide free health screenings and free medicines and offers comprehensive health education to empower individuals to take charge of their well-being. However, the resources to sustain these programs are limited.

Under this initiative about 16873 patients at INDERDHANUSH CHARITABLE DISPENARY, GHAZIABAD get the benefit of health check-ups & free medicines that include vital assessments such as blood pressure monitoring, diabetes screening, and wellness consultations. By reaching out to these marginalized populations, NGOs can help educate them not only on how to access healthcare services but also on the importance of preventive care.

PSF-SAKHI Project

Delhi and NCR are among the largest metropolitan cities in India, and they are home to diverse communities. However, the slums, which house a significant portion of the city's population, face unique challenges that exacerbate the difficulties of menstrual hygiene management (MHM). Many women and girls in these areas lack access to basic sanitation facilities, clean water, and safe disposal methods for menstrual products. This not only affects their health but also limits their mobility, education, and participation in public life.

Menstrual health and hygiene are fundamental aspects of women's health that often go neglected, especially in places where resources are scarce. Sanitation facilities in slums are often inadequate. Many households lack private toilets, and public toilets are sometimes unavailable or poorly maintained. This situation poses a significant challenge for women during menstruation. Without access to clean and safe toilets, women are forced to manage their menstruation in unsafe conditions, which can lead to both physical and mental health issues.









The availability and affordability of menstrual products are critical factors in menstrual sanitation. In the slums of Delhi, access to sanitary pads is limited. Many women rely on cloth pieces or other makeshift materials due to the high cost of commercial sanitary products and lack of awareness about their availability. The implications of poor menstrual sanitation are far-reaching. Women in the slums face numerous health risks, including urinary tract infections and reproductive health issues. Additionally, menstrual-related absenteeism in schools and workplaces can lead to significant socio-economic impacts. Educating girls about menstrual health can empower them and improve their educational outcomes, ultimately benefiting their communities.

Recognizing these challenges, PSF has launched the initiative PSF-SAKHI to distribute free sanitary pads, which serve as a vital stepping stone toward improving the quality of life for these women and girls. The provision of free sanitary pads is about much more than just addressing a physical need; it's about empowering women and fostering a sense of dignity. Many beneficiaries report feeling more confident and capable of managing their menstrual health. This initiative provides valuable information about menstrual hygiene management, enabling women and girls to understand their bodies better and embrace their natural cycles. By educating communities about the importance of menstrual hygiene, these NGOs challenge the cultural taboos that often surround menstruation, fostering a supportive environment where girls can thrive.








